Nursery

What a lovely week we have had! This week we have been looking at our new number - number 3! We have been looking at what 3 looks like and how it is made up. We used numberblocks to help us. We enjoyed celebrating Number day on Friday. We sang lots of number songs and enjoyed all of our number activities. On Friday we also joined Reception to host our very own Baptism. We took on different roles such as the Priest, the parents, the Godparents and the congregation. We each made a Baptism card for the baby who we welcomed into God's family.

Reception

Yet again, another very busy week. We have started our new text 'Handa's Surprise' this week. We have read the story and we have tasted the fruit from the story. We have also been working really hard on our independent sentence writing, we are applying what we learn in phonics. In maths, we have been exploring the numbers 6, 7, and 8. We have been finding out which smaller numbers make up the whole number and the different ways we can represent them.

In RE we have performed our own Baptism service. We took on different roles such as the Priest, the parents, the Godparents and the congregation. We each made a Baptism card for the baby who we welcomed into God's family.

Year 1

We have had another brilliant week in Year One. In English, we finished our work on 'Unplugged' by answering comprehension questions about the story. We then introduced our new book 'Man on the Moon' and made predictions about what the character, Bob, might do on the moon. In Maths, we completed our unit on Place Value within 20, assessing what the children could apply from all of their knowledge. We have started our unit on addition and subtraction within 20, using counting on as a method of addition. In Science this week, we investigated what materials were flexible and discussed how this could be useful for certain objects. In History, we have started our topic on 'The History of Travel' and began by looking at how things were transported by canal in the past. In R.E, we discussed the people who help us in church and listened to the story of the Presentation of Jesus. We had a lovely mass on Thursday to celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus. A big well done to all of our year one children, especially those who read bidding prayers.

Year 2

Year 2 have been working extremely hard this week! In R.E, we have completed our topic about 'Books'. We have discussed the Gospel stories that we have learnt over the past 4 weeks and the children chose their favourite one and explained why it was important to them.

In English, we have been creating our own information leaflets about the bird that we researched last week. The leaflets look absolutely fantastic and the children have put so much effort into making them eye-catching and engaging!

In Maths, we have started our 'Shape' unit and the children have been learning the properties of 2D shapes, including sides and vertices.

In Science, we have been looking at animal offspring and the children have been learning about the groups of animals that do not look like their adults when they are born.

To end another fantastic week, the children have enjoyed celebrating Number Day and they have participated in lots of exciting Maths activities!

Question: Which groups of animals do not look like their adult when they are born?



Year 3

In year 3 this week we have had a busy week of learning. In English we have analysed two poems by Matt Goodfellow and used the ideas to write our own poems about the Minotaur from the myth 'Theseus and the Minotaur'. There was some fantastic rhyming poems produced! In Maths we have looked at measuring in cm and mm, converting between the units and solving problems. We have also continued to practise a range of math skills on our personal freckle accounts.

In History we have researched the origins of the original Olympic Games in Ancient Greece and compared it to the current modern games. The children really enjoyed learning about how different the original games were.

In RE we have read through some of the stories of Mary in the bible and wrote about how we perceive Mary based on the events told within these stories.

In Art this week the children have created Ancient Greek plates which have ended up looking amazing! Well done everyone!

Question- Can you name something the same and something different about the original Olympic Games and the modern games?

Year 4

We have worked hard in Year 4 this week.

In RE we have been continuing to explore the meaning and importance of 'Community,' both as part of a diocese and a parish. The children extended this to look at our school community. They made a leaflet to explain and illustrate how our school acts as a community and how welcoming our community is to new pupils and their families.

In English, we are preparing to write a magazine article, persuading people that we need to make Droylsden a greener city. We have looked in detail at the benefits this brings to a city and practical ways of doing it.

In Maths this week, all the children took a mock multiplication test. They went out of class to do this in small groups. Everyone had a good go at it so the children are now familiar with the format of the formal multiplications check which they will do in the Summer Term. Our work on formal multiplication methods is now extending into word problems and reasoning.

We have enjoyed starting our new class novel, 'Omar the Accidental Trouble Magnet.' The children find it both engaging and funny.

Question: How can 'green cities' help communities to develop?



Year 5

In Year 5 this week, we have continued our use of long multiplication for 4 digit X 2 digit numbers. The children are working incredibly hard and becoming more confident every day. On Number Day, we also worked in small groups to solve a number of Nrich problems, as well as taking part in a whole-school TTRS competition.

This week, we have continued to research and compare Tripoli and Manchester. We have focused on both physical and human geography - comparing populations, climate and terrain, as well as the daily lives of inhabitants of both Tripoli and Manchester.

In Science, we looked at reversible and irreversible changes and conducted an experiment to separate materials through evaporation, magnetism, filtration and sieving. The children made predictions, made decisions about the most appropriate method, conducted the experiment and recorded their results.

We can't wait to celebrate Children's Mental Health Week and Safer Internet Day next week.

Question: What is the most appropriate method to separate flour and water?.

Year 6

We have had a brilliant week in Year 6! We have especially participating in a range of number activities today that included a TTRS competition and an investigation of number patterns in shape!

We began our unit of work on decimals in maths this week. The children have impressed the staff with how quickly they were grasping challenging concepts including rounding, adding and subtracting decimals.

In English, we have focused upon Via and Summer's chapters in Wonder. We have listened to their recounts of Auggie story and made links to popular songs. The children had the opportunity to write the beginning of Summer's chapter in the form of a prediction which was greatly enjoyed!

In Religion this week, we have continued looking at Priest hood. We learnt about Saint John Mary Vianney and considered why he is the patron saint of Priests.

Question: Via compares Auggie to the sun in Wonder. Why?
