

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Nursery

NEWSLETTER

This week we have finished our book 'Happy to be.' The children have worked really hard with learning words and actions to read the book aloud using a story map to help. The children have been using their imaginations to create their own stories. In maths we have continued to look at matching objects. In Phonics, we have worked on our listening ears by walking round the school grounds, playing instruments and singing nursery rhymes. In RE we began creating sunny grams where the children say kind words about their classmates. These will go on display before being added to the children's learning journals.

Reception

What a lovely week we've had in Reception! In Literacy we have continued looking at the story 'The Leaf Thief'. The children have enjoyed sequencing the story and learning some new vocabulary from the book. In Maths, we have been comparing size and mass. The children have loved using balance scales to discover which object is heavier and which is lighter. On Tuesday, it was Hello Yellow day where the children came into school wearing yellow to support World Mental Health Day. On this day, we attended our first Assembly along with Nursery and KS1 to learn all about having a healthy mind. As October is Black History Month, on Thursday the children learnt about Mae Jemison. They even made their own rockets and space helmets during their independent learning time. They looked AMAZING!

We are really excited for our final week before half term!

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Newsletter

Year 1

This week the children have shown greater independence in their rainbow challenges across the curriculum- well done Year 1!

In English the children have been working hard to develop their story language using our text "Pussy Cat, Pussy Cat where have you been?" - we can see the impact of their phonics is having on their sentence work. In maths we are coming to the end of our work on place value and have been comparing and ordering numbers to 10. We have also been putting numbers on a number line. We began using our knowledge to add and subtract within 10.

In science we learnt about our sense of taste - we explored savoury, sweet, sour, salty and bitter foods. The children enjoyed carrying out an experiment to group foods.

We have started a new RE topic on Judaism and looking at the story of Abraham & Sarah. In history we compared the Lives of Queen Victoria and Queen Elizabeth I.

On Tuesday we took part in Hello Yellow Day and spent time completing fun activities that helped us learn about how important our mental health is.

Year 2 have had a fantastic week! On Tuesday, they enjoyed participating in 'Hello Yellow' day and learnt about ways that we can look after our mental health.

We have completed our place value unit in Maths and this week, the children practised counting in multiples of 2, 5, 10 and 3.

In English, we have continued our study of The Highway Rat and the children produced descriptive 'Wanted' posters and they analysed the features of a diary entry.

In Science, we have been learning about reptiles and amphibians and the children have been able to recognise their needs for survival.

We have been looking at a special Psalm in R.E and the children finished the week with a lovely Mass.

In preparation for our Great Fire of London workshop, the children placed the key events of the disaster on a timeline.

Question: What do reptiles need that other animals don't?

Year 3

This week we have been looking at the significance of the Rosary, especially in the month of October. We recited the prayers of the rosary and then wrote our own morning prayer. Later, we made our own rosary beads.

In Maths, we finished our unit on Place Value and were preparing to start our new unit on Addition and Subtraction.

In Science we learned about the functions of the skeleton and how different bones are designed to carry out particular jobs, helping us to move whilst protecting our organs.

In English, we completed our diary entry from the bear's viewpoint. We thought about how the bear would feel as he left his home in the forest to make his life in the busy city.

On World Mental Health Day, we read a story called, 'The Huge Bag of Worries' which was all about how important it is to talk about our worries with others. On Friday we enjoyed a lovely mass in church. The theme was kindness.

lear 4

We have had another busy and productive week in Y4.

In English, we have continued to look at our book, 'The Lost Happy Endings', In class, we have been using conjunctions and planning and writing our character analyses of either Jub or The Witch!

In Maths, we are looking at addition and subtraction using a written method and place value charts, and the children have been working hard to maintain their presentation in books.

In Science, we have concluded our unit and the children have completed their end of unit assessment. They have learnt about vertebrates and invertebrates; flowering and non-flowering plants, and how to use a classification key to store information accurately.

In RE, we also concluded our unit: 'Where do I come from?' and the children have been reflecting on their knowledge of Joseph as Jesus' adopted father.

We also had a lot of fun in Forest School this week, and celebrated World Mental Health Day on Tuesday by wearing something yellow and talking about how we can overcome our own doubts and insecurities and help ourselves in the future.

Another wonderful week in Year 5! 5GB performed a fantastic class assembly on Wednesday, celebrating their hard work from this half term. We were extremely proud of the children. Thank you to all those parents and carers who attended.

In English this week, we published the children's narratives from an alternative viewpoint, as well as writing our own poem based on 'Refugees' by Brian Bilston. This is a thought-provoking poem, which has an opposite viewpoint when read from bottom to top. Although challenging, the children had some fantastic ideas and produced quality work.

Formal written methods for addition and subtraction have been our focus in Maths this week. We revised the addition and subtraction of 4 digit numbers before moving on to numbers up to 1,000,000. We also applied our understanding to missing digit calculations, identifying errors and problem solving.

In History, we explored the Maya number system, identifying numbers up to 5,000 and using Mayan symbols to create our own calculations.

Finally, for World Mental Health Day, we read 'Shelter for Sadness' by Anne Booth. We talked about what makes us sad, how we deal with those feelings and what brings us comfort. We will be concluding this work in our Forest School sessions next week.

Sear B

This week in English we continued our work on our novel: The Final Year. We read about Nate's residential and mapped out his emotions during the trip. The children then wrote diary entry entry recounting the trip; thinking especially about use of varied vocabulary and sentence structure.

In Maths, we have been working through division. This has included looking at short division and how we can use factors to help. The children have then been applying this knowledge to prove or disprove statements.

In Science, we continued our work on classification and used our knowledge of classification keys to classify trees. The children are extremely enthusiastic about their science lessons and we can't wait to see their knowledge applied to practical investigations.

In History, we began our work on Evacuation. The children learnt about why evacuation happened and analysed a range of sources.

Question: Why are not all evacuation photographs reliable evacuation sources?

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
