A MESSAGE FROM MR LAVIN... Welcome back to the first newsletter since our return to school following the mid-term break. I hope you enjoyed the break and spending some special time with your families. We have had a great start to the term with lots of exciting things happening around school - I am sure you will enjoy reading all about these in the class summaries later in the newsletter.

World War 1 Week - We had a special themed week based on World War 1 this week. Each year group took a different aspect/ event that happened and studied it in detail. Some of the work children have produced has been outstanding.

All Saints Day - On Wednesday, we attended mass as a whole school to celebrate All Saints Day. It was a lovely celebration and as always, children's singing and behaviour was remarkable. Many of the parishioners commented on how much they loved seeing the children at mass. Remember mass it on Saturday evening at 5:30 pm and Sunday morning at 10:30am - Father would be delighted to see the children there!

School Photographs - On Monday it is individual, and siblings, school photographs. If your child usually comes into school in their PE on Monday, we would advise that they come into school in their full school uniform and they can change into their PE kit after the photographs have been taken. We ask that full school uniform is worn, including a school tie.



Nursery

What an amazing first week back we have had. The children have read and re-told the story of Meg and Mog, invented their own stories and began to use puppets to retell familiar stories. In Maths the children have been sorting objects and guessing the rule. On Thursday we started our new story book 'Owl Babies.' The children have really enjoyed flying round outside like owls, sorting feathers and owl footprints and have made a large owl tree for our display. We also took part in WW1 week and made a large poppy wreath for our classroom door. Next week the children are going to take part in Forest School - where possible every child needs to bring wellies/appropriate footwear in for this.

Reception

What an amazing MONSTER week we've had. The children have made and described a monster sock puppet (thank you for all of the sock donations!!), we have made monster biscuits, we have fed the monsters some monster sounds. We have created monsters in the creative area and written names for them in the writing area. In the construction area we have designed and built homes for our monsters to live in! In maths we have been looking at circles and triangles - we used these shapes to make shape monsters.

We had an amazing time at our monster ball. We ate monster food, played monster games and of course did some monster dancing!!

On Thursday afternoon, we learnt about World War 1 as part of the school's World War 1 week. Next week, we will complete some poppy art with our Year 6 special friends.

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Newsletter

Year 1

We have had a lovely first week back in school. The children have settled back into routines with ease. It has been good to see them working more independently in their Rainbow Challenges.

In English we have started our new story "Supertato" by Sue Hendra.. The children were surprised to find the Evil Pea had visited our classroom and caused some chaos! They have created Wanted posters to track him down!. In maths we have been learning our number bonds to 10.

We have had a focus on WWI and the children have been learning about the purple poppy and how it commemorates the efforts of animals in service.

In science we have started to look at the seasons, with a focus on autumn and changes in our environment. We have also been learning about the significance of remembrance in history and in our faith. In RE we have been discussing what it means to belong.

Question: Can you recall number bonds to 10 quickly?

Year 2

Year 2 have had a very busy first week back and we have been completing all our units from last half term. We have now finished our learning about the Great Fire of London and the children have a good understanding of how firefighting methods have changed and how London was rebuilt after the fire. We can't wait to showcase our work to you in our assembly next Wednesday! In Science, we have been learning about humans as mammals and we investigated how exercise increases our heart rate. We have completed our Judaism unit in R.E and the children have written their own blessings for Shabbat.

Question: How was London rebuilt after the Great Fire of London?

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Year 3

Another jam packed week in Year 3. The children were so excited to start our new English book, 'Stone Age Boy.' They enjoyed creating a conversation in role between the main character and the Stone Age girl.

This week in History, we learnt about the truce in World War One. This was when the British and German troops took part in a football match and exchanged small presents. The children completed a fascinating piece of writing. They wrote a diary entry as one of the British soldiers, describing events and expressing how he felt to be so far from home.

In Maths we have been working hard on our three times tables. Many of the children are already confident.

In RE this week, we explored an aspect of Judaism. Specifically, synagogues and the job of the rabbi. The children found it interesting to point out the similarities and differences between a synagogue and a church.

Question: What is the name of the Jewish holy book?

Year 4

This week in year 4 we have completed our English work on our class book Lost Happy Endings. We have edited our work to improve our draft version and published on a cool, witches hat template.

In math we have moved onto looking at area. We have looked at counting squares inside shapes to calculate the area of given shapes.

In RE we have begun our new unit focused on 'being called'. We looked at stories of being called and spoke about the decisions made. We also read through the bible story of David being called called to be King by God and we re-told this story in our own written form.

In Science we have started our new unit on matter. We have analysed the three elements of matter and looked at the processes that take place to move matter from one state to another.

Question- What are the three forms of matter?

A fantastic week here in Year 5. We were excited to welcome the children back after the half term and we have produced some great pieces of work.

Developing our understanding of Ancient Maya, the children conducted research into the Maya Calendar and discovered that the Mayans had three calendars which were used simultaneously; the Long Count, the Haab and the Tzolkin. We used this research and information to produce some excellent double page spreads. The children should be very proud of their achievements.

In English, we have utilised our understanding of formal language and letter structure to produce formal letters of complaint to our local MP, Angela Rayner. With inspiration from 'Saving the butterfly', the children unpicked and understood problems faced by refugees in the UK. This generated some interesting, thoughtful and considerate discussions regarding the conditions which are faced and the children identified possible solutions to these. The children worked extremely hard to make appropriate choices of formal language to make their writing more sophisticated and we are excited to post the published pieces of writing to Angela Rayner.

In RE, we have completed our unit on 'Ourselves' by planning a collective worship to celebrate and rejoice in what we have learnt. These will be held next week. To begin our new unit on Judaism, the children have began writing non-chronological reports about the Passover, considering how it is celebrated, why it is important and when it is held.

Question: How many days were in the Tzolkin year?

Year B

Year 6 have come back with a fantastic attitude towards their learning. We have completed our final pieces of writing on the Final Year in English. The children wrote an apology letter from PS to Nate and enjoyed writing informally whilst showing off their knowledge of sentence structure.

Within our spelling lessons, we have revised adding the ly suffix. Assignments have been set on spelling shed for the children to complete and we would encourage all children to log in at home.

In Maths this week, we have been finishing off our unit on addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. This has included looking at the order of operations and how to use known facts to help us with further problems.

In RE, we have completed our unit on God's love for us. We used our poetic knowledge and understanding from English to write poems to reflect upon God's love.

Finally, in History we have learnt about the Manchester Blitz. The children wrote detailed diary entries recounting what a night in shelter was like during the Blitz. The emotive language used was fantastic!

Question: When did the Manchester Blitz take place?

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
