Year 2: 9:35 am - 9:40 am


We will allow you to take individual photographs of your child but you will not be allowed to photograph or film the parade for Safeguarding reasons.



Nursery

In Phonics this week we have been singing the nursery rhyme 'Twinkle, Twinkle little Star.' We are very confident in recognising rhyming words and clapping syllables to words. Our sound focus this week was 'r' we enjoyed our phonics game 'What's in the box?' and know that 'rainbow', 'rabbit', 'rice' and 'ring' all begin with the 'r' sound.

We loved celebrating St Patrick's day on Monday, we made hats, learned all about the traditions and enjoyed messy play and had so much fun Irish dancing.

In our Liturgy session this week, we enjoyed singing some of our favourite songs, 'This Little Light of Mine' and 'Our God is a Great Big God.'

We are so proud of our children who continue to say our dinner time prayer and hometime prayer with lots of confidence and respect.

We have been enjoying our outdoor provision this week and have made the most of the lovely weather, Mrs Artingstall visited our Nursery to help with the planting and new ideas we have had and this week we created another habitat, this time for a hedgehog using the off cuts of willow from our willow tunnel and arch. We also used the sticks as a tool to dig small holes in the soil when planting broad beans. We can't wait to watch them grow!

Reception

We have had a wonderful week in Reception. Lots of learning as always. Phonics and reading has been a particular highlight - the children are doing so well and are growing in confidence every day!

At the start of the week we learnt about the Holy Spirit in RE. We made our own Holy Spirits and watched how they moved all around us outside, just like the real Holy Spirit does to help us learn more about the ways of Jesus.

In Literacy, we have completed our class text "Lulu Loves Flowers." We have been watching our own sunflowers grow too, some of them have started shooting and we can see some roots. We will continue to look after them with all of the things they need. We enjoyed our forest school session with Mrs Artingstall too! In Maths we started our new unit called "building 9 and 10." We have been comparing numbers to 10 and representing 9 and 10. Next week we will focus on

the special number bonds to 10.

We hope you have a lovely and restful weekend ready for another busy week in Reception.

Newsletter

Year 1

What a lovely week we have had in Year! In science we went on a lovely ,sunny spring walk, observing seasonal changes. In maths we continued to deepen our understanding of numbers to 50 by finding and estimating positions on a number line. We also used our knowledge to find one more or one less of a given number to 50. In English we spent our sessions revising punctuation and grammar. We continue to work hard to improve our spelling and reading in our daily phonics sessions.Our geography lesson helped us understand how the weather changes over the four seasons and how it affects humans.In RE we considered our Lenten promises and look at symbols of Lent.

Year 2

We have had another lovely week in Year 2 and enjoyed getting out in the sunshine. We began the week with a forest school session where the children thought about saying thank you to God for the things in our world.

The children made some clay sculptures and loved petting the chickens in the allotments. In Maths this week we completed our multiplication and division unit by revising 2s, 5s and 10s. We now move onto length and height.

In English this week the children wrote letters of persuasion in the character of Mr Bunny. They also enjoyed a chocolate tasting session where they learnt more about the real methods in making chocolate and harvesting cacao.

In Science, we explored microhabitats and thought carefully about which minibeasts may live there.

In RE, we learnt about Palm Sunday and demonstrated our understanding of the scripture through drawing.

In Geography, we continue learning about weather patterns and have explored which continents in the world have the hottest climate. We enjoyed ending the week with some painting in Art exploring the expressive styles of Van Gogh and Paul Cezanne.

Year 3

Another busy week in Year 3.

In English, the children had to write the next chapter of George's Marvellous Medicine. They described what happened when Grandma was given George's potion. The children used a range of impressive verbs as well as dialogue to create an amusing piece of writing.In Maths this week we began our first unit on Fractions. We looked at the purpose of the denominator and the children had to order and compare sets of fractions. As the children's First Reconciliation approaches, we are preparing them for their sacrament. This week we talked about how important it is to take accountability for our actions and that God will listen to us when we say we are sorry. The children enjoyed talking and listening to each other's feelings when they thought about times they had made the wrong choices. This week we went back to finish our History topic on the Olympic Games and learnt all about the great athlete Jesse Owens. The children are preparing to write his biography.

Year 4

In Year Four this week, the children have been working hard and enjoying the sunnier weather.

In English, we have continued our work on Macbeth, studying the first chapter in which Macbeth meets the witches. We have been learning how to use prepositional phrases in our sentences and writing about the eerie scene on the Scottish moors. The children then further practiced these skills while writing a diary entry from the point of view of Macbeth and reflected on the confusing events and strange prophecies.

In maths, we have been learning to order and compare mixed numbers. The children did a great job at estimating where to place fractions on a number line! We continue to work on developing fluency and pace with our times tables. This week's focus has been the 12 times tables.

In science, we have been investigating the different sources of power that electrical appliances work from. We sorted household appliances according to whether they were powered by battery, the mains or solar power.

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Newsletter

Year 5

As always, this week has been a busy one in year 5. Rehearsals for the Passion in Holy Week are well underway and the children are working incredibly hard to ensure it is performed in a respectful and prayerful manner.

The week began with RE Retreats for both classes, where the children engaged in meaningful discussions about 'care for creation'. Through a combination of scripture, prayer, song, meditation and reflection, the children explored God's plan for creation. In response, they produced beautiful artwork, as well as heartfelt sorry prayers and poems. It was a wonderful workshop and our thanks go to Mrs Farmer, who delivers all of the retreats in school.

In History, we scrutinised both primary and secondary sources of evidence relating to the physical appearance and character of Henry VIII. The children analysed the reliability of the sources and identified what they could tell us about Henry's fascinating life. Following this, we explored the reasons behind the reformation - religious, political and economic.

Mathematics took us on a journey through reasoning and problem-solving as we tackled long multiplication before progressing to short and long division methods. This crucial area of learning will continue to be a focus in the coming weeks.

Year 6

What wonderful week here in Year 6! This week, the children have been working extremely hard and we are very proud of them. A big thank you to all those parents who attended 6GB's class assembly yesterday. It was lovely to see so many faces and to celebrate the children's work and achievements.

In English, we have focused on our new text, 'Romeo and Juliet', which the children have thoroughly enjoyed. After watching the first meeting scene at the Capulet ball, we carefully considered how this compared to the text by Matthews and Ross. We analysed the thoughts and feelings of both Romeo and Juliet as well as the significance of them finding out that they are from feuding families. After a deep analysis of the features of a diary entry, we have written diary entries of our own from either Romeo's or Juliet's perspective to recount the events. In Maths, we have worked hard to learn and understand the formulas when finding the area and perimeter of rectilinear shapes. The children were able to apply their prior knowledge and understanding of this successfully to support their understanding. Throughout the week, we have also learnt how to find the area of

any given triangle using the base and perpendicular height. Well done Year 6! Question: What is the formula for the area of a triangle?
