
Living Lent 2025

Jesus was teaching in the Temple when the teachers of the Law brought a woman to him who had broken the Law. They said to Jesus, "Master, this woman has broken the Law and should be stoned to death. What have you to say?"

Jesus bent down and started writing on the ground with his finger. As they persisted with their question, he looked up and said, "If there is one of you who has not sinned, let him be the first to throw a stone at her." When they heard this they went away quietly, one by one, beginning with the eldest, until Jesus was left alone with the woman. Then Jesus asked the woman, "Has no one condemned you?" "No one, sir," she replied. "Neither do I. Go, but do not sin any more," said Jesus.

This Wednesday's Words are...



"Let us allow God's constant help to make us new people." Pope Francis

What did Jesus say to the woman? This Sunday's Gospel reveals the depths of God's mercy and compassion and the need for each one of us, in our own way, to make a new start with God. Regardless of our past, each day we are given an opportunity to make a new start. Jesus just waits for us with the gentleness and patience of God. Lent is traditionally a time for making a new start. Ask your child if they have made any new starts this Lent. If so, how's it going? How does their new start help them or others? It may help your child if you mention any new starts you have made recently - or especially for Lent - and tell them how it's going for you.

"Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow has not yet come. We have only today. Let us begin." St Teresa of Calcutta

God is always ready to help us to start afresh. As Easter approaches, are there any new starts that we can make with our family, friends or with God? Perhaps we can: remember to start each morning with a prayer and thank God for each new day and for each other; make a new start with church; follow Jesus' example in this Sunday's Gospel by being merciful to others. You may also like to choose something new to start together that will strengthen your family.



Dear Lord Jesus, please help us to be more understanding and always ready to make a new start with you and with each other. Amen.

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Nursery

It has been a very week in Nursery indeed!

Monday saw the arrival of 10 Living eggs! By Wednesday we had 3 baby chicks and by Thursday Evening we had 9 baby chicks!

We have also been carefully observing our Class Caterpillars, they are still in their cocoon stage and

This week in Phonics, we have enjoyed the rhyme 'Wind the Bobbin up', continuing with rhyming words and our sound focus of 'b'.

In Maths we have consolidated our learning on Capacity, we have also been working hard to use preposition words when describing where the Teddy Bear is placed.

In our RE sessions we have been listening to the Easter Story, we have reflected on the story and spoke about how special Jesus is.

We have enjoyed singing 'Magic Penny' and 'Our God is a Great Big God' in our Liturgy sessions this week as well as coming together in a lovely circle to reflect on what Jesus means to us.

Reception

What a great week of weather we have had! Spring has definitely sprung in Reception and we have jumped into April with some fantastic learning.

We have started our new text "The Woolly Bear Caterpillar." This is all about life cycles, but also underpins the golden thread of our school of vision: "Every child, every chance, every day," being kind and including everyone. It is definitely worth a watch on YouTube. The book will carry over into the new half term after Easter, ready for us to welcome our own caterpillars.

This week, we finished our maths unit all about 9 and 10 where we have really focused on the bonds to 10. Knowing these off by heart will really help us as we move up through school.

Year 1

This week has been busy and productive. We have been so pleased with how the children have approached their assessments over the last two weeks. Regular reading and phonics homework is really paying off, thank you for all your support.

We started a new book this week called Big Bad Owl. The children wrote lovely sentences to describe the setting of Cupcake Woods. They also generated interesting questions to ask Scowl, the grumpy owl in the story. They enjoyed making a "Happy Hat" like the one worn by Little Bird who tries to cheer up Scowl.

In maths we have been learning about capacity and volume. We have been comparing and describing volumes of different containers. In geography we completed our end of topic assessment on Weather – the children have remembered so muck key knowledge.

In RE we continue to look at the story of Palm Sunday and its importance during Holy Week.

Year 2

What a busy week in Year 2! The children have been completing their spring assessments, and have shown resilience and determination throughout. We could not be more proud of them.

This week in Maths the children have completed their work with length and height and are really confident with this. In English, the children consolidated their understanding of our Shakespeare text 'Ella Bella Ballerina' based on 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' by writing a diary entry detailing events in the story.

Throughout the week we have been working hard on our D&T project making hand puppets. The children have practised a running stitch, designed their puppet and have been making it using felt. They have thoroughly enjoyed it. We completed the week with a lovely Celebrating of the Word, ahead of the fifth Sunday of Lent.

Year 3

This was a very special week in Year 3 as the children in the Sacramental Programme made their First Reconciliation on Thursday afternoon. It was a beautiful service supported in prayer and song by the Year 3 children who were not in the programme. This week was also special as both Year 3 classes enjoyed a retreat day with Mrs Farmer. The children had the opportunity to meditate on Jesus' parables and to write down their personal thoughts and prayers. On Monday it was Eid and Mrs Nourine kindly brought in some festive food and celebrated with the children.

In Maths, we have continued with our fraction work, looking at non-unit fractions and fractions on scales. We are also doing well on our six times table. In English, we finished off a letter from King Lear to his daughter Cordelia asking for forgiveness for his bad behaviour. In Science we have started a new unit on Light. In our first lesson we looked at light sources as well as sources of natural and artificial light. In Spanish we completed our unit on musical instruments.

Year 4

With the sun shining, Year Four have had a great week!

We began the week in English by writing a letter to Macbeth, either persuading him to follow through with his wicked plans or urging him to reconsider. The children have loved this story so far and really enjoy discussing the themes and characters. Their writing was excellent and really showcased their abilities.

In RE, we have thinking about Lent. We have been reading scripture that teaches us about Jesus' time in the desert and how to live in God's way during this special time. The children created some collages which included images and symbols relating to Ash Wednesday and scripture. We then carried out some research on the Catholic Charity CAFOD to find out how they offer aid and almsgiving to those who most need it.

In Geography, we have be learning about some of the world's most famous mountain ranges. The children did an excellent job of plotting them on a map and recalling their knowledge of continents.

Year 5

Year 5 have had another excellent week of learning!

In English, we concluded our work on *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, where the children delved into the characters of Hermia, Helena, Lysander, and Demetrius. They produced some excellent character descriptions, showcasing their understanding of the story.

In Maths, we began exploring decimals, focusing on decimals to two decimal places and investigating the equivalence between fractions and decimals.

Our Religion lessons centered around the 'Mystery of Faith' prayer, where the children thoughtfully crafted their own child-friendly versions, capturing its deeper meaning.

In History, we continued our study of the Tudors, examining the effects of the Reformation on various groups of people and its lasting impact on the modern world. To round off the week, we celebrated a beautiful mass, where the children showed great reverence and participated with enthusiasm. It's been a week filled with learning, reflection, and growth!

Year 6

What a lovely week it has been here in Year 6, especially with the nicer weather! In English, we have worked extremely hard to use formal language and cohesive devices to plan, write and edit newspaper articles outlining the events of the fight scene in Romeo and Juliet. The children should be really proud of themselves. Towards the end of the week, we analysed persuasive letters and considered

Towards the end of the week, we analysed persuasive letters and considered different viewpoints on the appropriate outcome of Romeo's crime in preparation to plan and write a persuasive letter to the Prince of Verona next week.

In Maths, we have begun our unit on 'Shape' whereby the children have utilised their understanding and use of protractors to measure and classify angles before using known facts to calculate angles around a point and on a straight line, vertically opposite angles and interior angles of a triangle. Well done year 6! We will continue our leaning on angles next week as we begin to look at angles in quadrilaterals, polygons and circles.

In History, we have continued our learning of 'Crime and Punishment' by delving into Roman punishments and considering how this compared and influenced punishments for crimes today.

Question: How many degrees are there on a straight line and in a full turn?
