

### Wednesday 7th May 2025


Jesus is the patient shepherd who never gives up on us. He came so that we could experience the fullness of life here, and to lead us into the joys of eternal life.



### **Nursery**

This week in Nursery, we have enjoyed the rhyme 'Hickory Dickory Dock' in our phonics sessions.

We have been focusing on the initial sounds in our own names and learning to recognise our own names independently as we come into Nursery each morning.

In Maths this week, we have enjoyed the rhyme '5 Little Men in a Flying Saucer' we have been learning to sequence events in the order that they happen using language such as first, next, after and last.

We have continued listening to our topic book 'The Odd Egg' this week, remembering the sequence of events in this book and what hatched from each egg along the way. We have then used a story map to retell the story in detail.

In our creative area this week we have been decorating our own 'Odd Eggs' and enjoyed a lovely activity of decorating Mary Our Lady. We know how special Mary is.

Today we joined in a very special ceremony outside of our church alongside the reception children where we got to Crown Our Lady- we placed flowers by her statue and sang songs and said prayers with respect.

Question-What colour do we associate with Mary?

### Reception

I can't believe we're already well into May—another week has flown by! The children continue to amaze us with their hard work and enthusiasm, and we are so proud of all they are achieving.

This week, we began exploring our new class text: "Things with Wings." This engaging non-fiction book is all about animals and insects that have wings. In Literacy, we've been summarising key points and sharing our favourite facts from the text—ask your child what they've learned!

In Maths, our focus has been on numbers beyond 10. We've explored 15, 16, 17, 18, and 19, using subitising skills to recognise how many have been added to 10 without counting. Outdoor learning was a real highlight this week. The children got creative making their own spider webs and explored new ways to write and make marks outside. Their creativity and curiosity continue to shine—well done, Reception!

In RE, we've been learning about Mary, the Mother of Jesus. We took part in a special crowning service at the Mary statue outside church, and some of the children had the opportunity to do a reading. It was a beautiful moment of reflection and celebration.

### Year 1

This week, along with the rest of the school, we have been praying for the Cardinals as they elect a new Pope. We watched a live broadcast from The Vatican about the election of the new Pope. We have also started to think about our new unit of work about holidays and holy days. In English, we continue work on our class story 'Meerkat Mail'. The children used emojis to describe how Sunny felt during the different places he visited. They then wrote sentences to describe Sunny, using colourful semantics. In Maths, children have been counting in multiples of 5 and recognising equal groups. In Science this week, the children have been learning about the difference between deciduous and evergreen trees. In History, we celebrated VE day and recognised its significance. As May is the month of Mary, year one have created Mary- Queen of Peace artwork on a canvas. We also crowned Mary with flowers in a special assembly. We finished the week with a lovely mass all about spreading peace.

Question- What is the difference between deciduous and evergreen trees?

### Year 2

What a busy 4 day week it has been! During prayer and liturgy, we have been focusing on the election of a new Pope and we joined a live assembly from Rome about this. As well as this, we have continued to honour Mary in the month of May and we have produced some beautiful artwork for a canvas which we shared in assembly today, focusing on Our Lady of Lourdes. During this assembly, we also crowned Mary with flowers and then we went to Mass to reflect on how we can spread peace.

In English, we planned a letter of response about whether we think the Junkyard Man will let Arfy be his dog or not. We will be writing these next week before we find out whether Arfy finds an owner.

We have now finished our Mass and Capacity unit in Maths and we have learnt how temperature is measured.

Yesterday, we celebrated the 80th anniversary of VE day and the children were very interested in learning about this.

To end our week, we had an Art day where we looked at construction as a form of art and we created our own stick people in Forest School.

Question: What does VE day mark?



### Year 3

This week the children enjoyed watching a special live broadcast from The Vatican about a new Pope being elected. They learnt about how this is done and joined in prayers asking God to help the Cardinals make a wise choice. On Friday it was lovely to see all the flowers the children brought into school to adorn Our Lady in the hall. Year 3 read about Our Lady of Knock and painted her on a canvas. Year 3 also joined Years 1 and 2 at mass today. The theme of the mass was 'Spreading Peace.' This week in English we continued with our book, 'Escape to Pompeii' and the children looked at vocabulary which describes a volcano and its eruption. They also recapped on using inverted commas to show speech by writing short dialogues. In our Maths unit on Mass, the children practised comparing masses of objects as well as adding and subtracting grams and kilograms. We began our new history topic about Boudicca by placing historical events on a timeline, starting with the Stone Age.

Question from Science: Can you explain how we see objects?

#### Year 4

Although it's only been a four-day week in school, we've still been very busy in Year Four!

Our English lessons are still focused on Dare to Care: Pet Dragon and the children have been using their analysis and inference skills to uncover new information about the content and style of our new text through a variety of CLIMB questions and predictions. The children seem to be really enjoying this text so far! In Maths, we are still learning about fractions and decimals and the children are persevering brilliantly. Please can I ask that you continue to push the children to practise their times tables again and again, as we head towards the MTC date. There has been a notable improvement in the scores so we hope that this continues to improve further as time goes on! Well done, children! Our RE lessons at the moment have been focused on Pope Francis, and today, the children watched a live video from Rome where Conclave are deliberating over who our new Pope will be. The children were fascinated to learn about this process. We also crowned Our Lady in assembly this morning and the children have produced some lovely artwork and brought in beautiful flowers to go with this. Finally, in science, we have been discussing sustainability and looking into the advantages and disadvantages of electricity and in geography, the children learnt about the different zones of a mountain.

### Year 5

We've had a fantastic week in Year 5!

In English, we've now finished reading *Brightstorm*, and the children are excited to get started on writing their own newspaper articles based on the dramatic events that took place on the Third Continent. They are looking forward to reporting the real truth!

In Maths, we have been rounding decimals and have started to explore

percentages—beginning with spotting them in images and converting them into fractions. Science has been particularly fun, as we've been looking at the different stages of human development, focusing on babies and children. A real highlight was when the children compared their own baby photos to how they are now—lots of smiles and laughter! Thank you for providing the baby photographs for the children.

In History, we have looked carefully at the reign of Elizabeth I and why it was called the 'golden age'.

We also took part in the Crowning of Mary on Friday, which was a beautiful and thoughtful way to welcome the month of May and remember our Mother Mary.

Questions: What does percent mean? What is 75% as a fraction?

### Year 6

This week, the children have worked incredibly hard to consolidate their knowledge and understanding of key skills and concepts across the curriculum. We have continued our revision in grammar lessons, focusing specifically on inverted commas, commas for clarity as well as recapping word classes and being 'markers' to highlight areas of misconception and make necessary adaptations to answers which have been completed incorrectly. A difficult skill which the children have worked hard to develop. In maths, the children have continued to practice arithmetic questions daily and have worked hard in lesson to consolidate their understanding of symmetry and reflection in preparation for the reasoning papers next week. Well done Year 6!

In History, we have continued our learning on Crime and Punishment - looking at punishments for crimes during the Anglo-Saxon period. The children learnt about Wergild and considered whether they deemed the punishment fair and fit for the crime. This generated some excellent discussions and interest in the topic!

We know that the SATs can be daunting but this is your opportunity to showcase everything you have learnt. All of the hard work will pay off! Good luck Year 6 - we are rooting for you!
