

## SHARING SUNDAY'S GOSPEL WITH PARENTS & FAMILIES

### Dear Parents and Carers,

This Sunday, the Church celebrates the great feast of Corpus Christi [two Latin words which mean 'the Body of Christ']. In some parts of the world there are processions through the streets. This is traditionally a time when children make their First Holy Communion.

The gathering in this Sunday's Gospel wasn't just a huge, miraculous, open-air picnic. This was a sign of the Eucharist (Holy Communion) which Jesus would establish with his disciples at the Last Supper.

### Wednesday 18th June 2025

Jesus makes the same offer to nourish us today, especially when we receive Holy Communion a sacred moment, when we receive a gift from heaven - we receive Jesus. This helps us become closer to Jesus and closer to each other - to keep growing in goodness and love.

Enjoy exploring this Sunday's Gospel and this Wednesday's word, which is NOURISH.

For this week's prayer, why not ask your child if they can remember the grace they say at school before their meals?

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

### **Nursery**

We had a lovely start to the week, by sharing our weekend news during our Monday carpet time session.

The children have really enjoyed sharing their news and shown lots of confidence when talking in front of their friends and teachers.

In Phonics, we have enjoyed recapping the nursery rhyme 'Row, Row, Row your Boat' and learning our new sound focus 'w'. We know that 'wave', 'wig' and 'web' all begin with the 'w' sound.

We have loved our outdoor area this week, making the most of the lovely weather. We have loved exploring the water and sand areas and making perfumes, food and potions in our mud kitchen using flowers, leaves and grass from our own nursery garden.

In RE this week we have been talking about our Wonderful World that God has given us. We were introduced to what Our World looks like and really enjoyed looking at a globe and exploring all the countries on one. We found the UK on the globe and were surprised how small it is compared to other countries. We listened to ways in which we can help look after environment in order to make it a better place for everyone.

### **Reception**

What a fantastic week we've had in Reception!

On Monday, we went on our exciting school trip and had an amazing time learning all about life under the sea. We discovered so many new facts and talked about how we can help protect our oceans. The children were brilliant ambassadors for our school – their behaviour was excellent. Well done, Reception!

This week in Literacy, we've been retelling the story "Somebody Swallowed Stanley" using a story map. Our Talk for Writing skills are really shining! The children have been using actions to help them write sentences from the story – and some have even written the whole story themselves!

In Maths, we've started our new unit on grouping and sharing. We've been learning how to share items fairly and spot when things have been shared unfairly – great work, everyone! In RE, we continued our topic on God's Wonderful World. We talked about the amazing animals and sea creatures God has made, and we wrote a special class prayer asking for their protection.

### Year 1

This week the children have been completing their end of year assessments for reading and maths. They have worked so hard applying what they have learnt this academic year. In our maths lessons, we continue to work on place value to 100. We have been partitioning numbers into tens and ones and locating bigger numbers on a number line.

In R.E, we discussed how people say sorry and forgive each other and matched emoji's to different scenarios. In PSHE, we sorted harmful and unharmful substances. In geography this week, we sorted features of a beach into human and physical features. We ended the week having lots of fun participating in the sponsored bounce-a-thon.

### Year 2

This week, we have been completing our end of year assessments and we are all so proud of the children's effort, determination and resilience when doing these. They have worked so hard in Year 2 and these assessments really reflect the progress all pupils have made. In English, we have started our new text, 'The Twits'. The children are already hooked with the story and we have been introduced to the characters of Mr and Mrs Twit. In preparation for our character description next week, we have described them using similes and used commas to list the contents of Mr Twit's beard!

We are almost at the end of our Fractions unit in Maths. This week, we have been reckoning and finding 3/4 of shapes and amounts.

In R.E, we have started our Reconciliation unit and thought about saying sorry to others. In Science, we have planted our bulbs and seeds to observe their growth over the next few weeks. We have also started to learn about animals and their offspring.

In History, we have learnt about the importance of lifeboats and how not having enough on the Titanic contributed to the disaster.

We ended our week with a fun-filled day with the Bounce-a-thon and forest school.

### Year 3

The children have worked really hard this week as they completed their summer assessments in Reading, Maths and Grammar. We have been making our last preparations for the First Holy Communion, looking at the virtues of Love, Stillness, Generosity and Gratitude. The children read about and discussed the events of the Last Supper and the significance of Jesus giving his disciples bread and wine. The children are looking forward to Saturday's mass and the celebrations which will follow.

In Science we completed our unit on Light by carrying out an experiment to discover how a shadow's size changes when the light source moves further away from the object. In English, we continued reading Stuart Little and picked out the main events of three chapters, writing about them and placing them in chronological order. In PE the children have been practising for Sports Day by learning how to pass a baton in the relay race.

### Year 4

It's been a fantastic week in Year 4! The sun has been shining and the children have been enjoying spending time outdoors.

We have completed our assessments this week and the children have shown great resilience whilst completing them- well done Year 4!

In our English lessons, we have been continuing to read 'The Day I was Erased'. We have looked at how dialogue is used within the texts and what the impact of it is. The children have done an amazing job at punctuating sentences that include dialogue in preparation for writing their own chapter of

Finally, in RE we have completed our other faith week by learning about Islam. It was been wonderful hearing from the children in both classes who follow Islam!

### Year 5

We've had a fantastic week in Year 5! The children have shown great perseverance and effort as they worked hard on their assessments, and we're proud of their positive attitudes.

In Maths, we continued learning about angles, focusing on using a protractor to measure and accurately draw different angles.

In English, we delved deeper into *Wonder*, exploring key events in the story and discussing why they are important.

Our Geography lessons took us into the rainforest, where we investigated the threats they face and created colourful and informative double-page spreads to show how we can help protect these vital ecosystems.

In Design Technology, we explored different types of bridges, thinking about advantages and disadvantages of their use.

In Religion, we reflected on the impact of the Holy Spirit following Baptism. We rounded off our busy week with the exciting bounceathon, which the children thoroughly enjoyed!

### Year 6

We're back to reality in Year 6 this week after our trip to PGL last week!

In P.S.H.E., we have started our "Created and Loved by God" unit. Initially, this was about identifying our gifts and talents, remembering that we are all different but made in God's image. We then moved on to look at girls' and boys' bodies. The children were all mature and sensible throughout the work. In R.E., we have been looking at The Ascension, concentrating on the impact Jesus had on his disciples when he returned to the Earth asking them to be witnesses. The children produced some excellent pieces of writing recounting the events as if they were a disciple, explaining their emotions throughout. We have also been extremely busy rehearsing for our end of year production. The children have really impressed us with their enthusiasm and dedication to learn their lines.
