Building Works

Exciting changes are coming to the school site! Significant building work will begin over the summer. This includes:

- Relocating the school offices closer to the car park by remodelling the current Year 6 classrooms

This project will take several months, and during this time the current Year 6 classrooms will be out of use.

One of the new Year 6 classrooms should be ready for September therefore we will be receiving a temporary classroom to accommodate the other Year 6 class. I will confirm these arrangements with Year 6 parents as soon as they're finalised.

Additionally, we're thrilled to announce that the Reception playground surface will be completely revamped over the summer break. I'm just awaiting the final design and will share it with you as soon as it's ready — it's shaping up to be a brilliant improvement for our youngest learners!

Wednesday 9th July 2025



Reception

We've had a great couple of weeks and are still over the moon with the arrival of our five beautiful butterflies! The children were thrilled to welcome Megan, Rizzy, Kerry, Gwen, and John into the world. During our Forest School session, we had a special moment releasing them into nature as we celebrated God's Wonderful World with Mrs Artingstall — a joyful reminder of the beauty all around

In Literacy, we've begun our final class text of the year: Commotion in the Ocean. The children are already hooked, and we're looking forward to diving deeper into this exciting underwater adventure next week.

In Maths, our focus has been on patterns, and we've been so impressed with the children's ability to identify and understand the unit of repeat. Their pattern-spotting skills are really shining through!

We had a very special experiences in RE. Our own Mrs Nourine gave a wonderful talk about Islamic prayer traditions. She brought in beautifully decorated prayer mats and other traditional objects, which the children explored with curiosity and respect. It was a lovely opportunity to deepen our understanding of different faiths. We also enjoyed an RE retreat with Mrs Farmer where we learned all about Jesus as our friend.

Year 1

This week has been absolutely jam-packed with fun and learning for Year One! A major highlight was our delightful trip to the beach, where the children had the chance to explore and discover both the human and physical features that make the seaside so special. They enthusiastically built their own mini beaches in the sand, fostering their creativity and collaboration skills. We were incredibly proud of how well they behaved; they truly were a credit to our school. In Maths, we delved into the concepts of 'before and after' as well as the days of the week. In RE, we completed our unit on being sorry, encouraging children to reflect on their actions and the importance of apologies. Our Science lessons this week involved an exciting exploration of the features associated with summer, from the weather to the local wildlife. In PSHE, we took the time to discuss the various communities we belong to, helping children understand their place in the wider world. To top it all off, children enjoyed a visit to their new Year Two class, allowing the children to familiarise themselves with their new environment and meet their new teacher.

Year 2

It's been another busy week in Year 2! We have now finished our text, The Twits, and the children wrote a fantastic diary entry from the perspective of Muggle-Wump. We have also been reading some Revolting Rhymes in Guided Reading.

In Maths, we have been telling the time to 5 minute intervals and learning how many minutes are in an hour.

In R.E, we have been completing our Islam unit which the children have been extremely interested in. We learnt about how Muslims prepare for prayer, and Mrs Nourine kindly shared some prayer mats and tasbih beads with us to look at too.

We have been completing our final D&T unit - moving vehicles. The children have analysed existing products and they have designed their own car. After practising cutting and assembling axels and wheels, they have now started to make their own.

We ended the week by meeting our new Year 3 teachers. The children had a wonderful morning and they are now excited for their new year group.

Year 3

The end of another busy week in Year 3.

In Maths we have been working hard on our new unit, 'Time.' The children have learnt to tell the time on analogue clocks and have practised working out time differences. In English we have continued with our unit on 'Stuart Little' by reading about when Stuart became a supply teacher. The children had to think about how brave Stuart has been throughout the book and rank his courageous acts. In Religion lessons as part of our Islam unit, we have looked at mosques, learning what they are used for and their important features. On Thursday Years 3 and 4 enjoyed their sportsday. It was a great afternoon. The children all tried their best in all events. The children had their last singing session with Miss Bradley on Wednesday. She allowed them to choose all their favourite songs from the year and the children sang their hearts out.

Year 4

What another amazing week in Year 4!

We finished off our unit on time by looking at converting between 12 and 24 hour clocks in Maths. We then began our final unit on shape where we have looked at angles- the children have really enjoyed this!

In English, we have continued reading 'The Day I was Erased'. The children have been revising how apostrophes are used for omission and possession and have been apply this into sentences of their own about the text. We can't wait to finish the book next week!

Our RE lessons have focused upon reconciliation. We have thought about times we have broken bridges of love with our friends, family and with God. We considered how we can repair these bridges with one another.

Science has been extremely exciting this week! The children have loved learning about layers of the teeth and have planned their own experiment exploring the effects of sugar on teeth. We will update you with the results next week!

Today, the children enjoyed meeting their new teachers for Year 5! We are going to miss the children greatly however, we know they are ready for their new adventure in UKS2!

Year 5

As we approach the end of year 5, the children are all busily preparing for the challenge of Year 6. All of the children enjoyed a wonderful morning in Year 6 in preparation for this important transition.

This week we have concluded our unit on Wonder in English. We began by reading and analysing the chapter 'The Bleeding Scream', comparing the text to the film version and identifying similarities and differences. Following this, we discussed the events within the chapter from the viewpoint of Jack Will. We hotseated how Jack Will would be feeling at this point and used advanced question stems to write questions and answer for Jack.

Having understood Jack's perspective, we were then able to plan and write the chapter from an alternative viewpoint. The children worked incredibly hard to incorporate varied sentence types, advanced punctuation, emotive language and speech into their written work.

In Maths this week, we have concluded our work on units of measurement by converting units of mass, length, capacity and time. We also used appropriate formulae to convert between imperial and metric units of measurement.

Year 6

As we get closer to the summer holidays, it feels busier than ever in Year 6!
The children (and our choreographer, Mrs. Devine) have worked incredibly hard to learn all the dances required for our production of The Greatest Showman. With the weather being so good, we have been able to practise out on the field and playground, which has made a lovely experience and a nice change from the hall.
All of the children have learned their lines and the production is looking like it will be a great success! Thank you for all those who have bought tickets and will be coming along to support the children next week.

In PSHE, we have been concentrating on Catholic Social Teaching. This has centred around the way that we should live our lives, supporting those most in need and ensuring that our world is cared for. The children have also been chronologically ordering the events in which God showed his love and care for us.

Finally, we have been working diligently and demonstrating our creative sides by producing books for our Special Friends. Yesterday, we went down to Reception to read to them and give them as gifts to our friends. There are some fabulous photos of them on the next page.
