

Nursery

We have had a busy first week back at Nursery. Our new story is 'Wow, said the Owl' which we are already enjoying. We have drawn owls thinking about the body parts, using lines and circles. We have also collaged using feathers and leaves, and made owls using playdough. We explored the forest and listened for owls, then worked out why we would not be able to hear them during the daytime. We did hear and identify lots of other sounds, including other birds. We have also been talking about and comparing size this week, in Mathematics.

Reception

What a lovely first week back we have had in Reception. It has been wonderful seeing the children excited to learn. Thank you to the parents who attended our phonics workshop. It was great to see you all and we hope you found the time useful.

We have started our new theme, 'Magic!' which the children have really enjoyed. We have been following instructions to make a magic wand, mixing potions, writing potion lists and role playing in our potion shop! In Literacy we have been reading a poem called "10 things found in a wizard's pocket!" The poem has really captured the children's imaginations and they came up with their own magical and spooky ideas!

In Maths, we have been thinking about the words 'more' and 'less' and what they mean. We have been looking at quantities and comparing two amounts. Our teachers have been asking us how we know there is more or less. We have been practising our special STEM sentences to help us, for example, "8 is more than 4 and 4 is less than 8."

We have also enjoyed taking part in World War 1 week in school. We learnt about poppies and their importance at this time of year. We worked hard to create our own poppy pictures which will be displayed in our classroom.

Year 1

We have had a very exciting first week back in year one! As you may have heard, we were visited by an Evil Pea who destroyed our classroom. After his visit, we made wanted posters to try and catch him. Luckily, the posters worked and Evil Pea has gone into hiding. In maths this week, we continue our work on number bonds within 10, working systematically to find them all. We have started to apply our knowledge to addition problems and children are working hard to improve fluency. As part of World War One week, we discussed the animals used in the war, focussing on Stubby the dog. We read the story by Michael Foreman and produced writing about what Stubby would have seen, heard, smelt and felt during the war. We then produced some Stubby artwork using purple Poppies. In R.E, we have started our topic on 'Belonging', completing our check in activity to assess what we already know about Baptism. In Science, we have started to think about what animals do to prepare for winter. As always, the children have been working hard in continuous provision to complete all of their challenges.

Sear 2

We have had yet another busy week in Year 2 this week.

In English the children have been excellent detectives, making inferences from given items and making predictions about our new text, 'The Mystery of the Missing Cake'. The children have created some excellent written work using their precursive writing and have been working hard to extend their ideas.

In Maths, the children have been investigating different fact families within 20. We have been exploring the idea that addition number bonds can be commutative. We are thrilled with the children's use of vocabulary in their Maths lessons.

In History, we have now completed our Great Fire of London unit. The children have explored the question, 'What happened after the Great Fire of London?' and have produced some beautiful double page spreads.

On Tuesday, we attended a whole school mass. The children conducted themselves brilliantly as we celebrated the day of 'All Saints'.

Year 3

This week in Year 3 we have had a huge focus on the 'Christmas Truce' from WW1. We have watched videos, listened to recounted diaries and analysed different sources. Using this learning, we have created art work, written diary entries and answered comprehension questions to check our understanding.

In English, we have begun our new class book of 'The Dark'. Over the next few weeks we will be using this text to write in a variety of different forms.

In Maths we have looked at methods for exchanging and borrowing in column addition and subtraction. The children have worked extremely hard at firstly understanding the concept and then applying it to their problem solving.

In RE, this week has been our 'Judaism' week. We have looked at the different elements of a synagogue and also the daily roles and duties of a Rabbi.

In Science we have looked at the different soil types. The children worked really hard at understanding the different layers of soils and also the properties of different types of soil.

Question- There are 5 layers of soil...Can you name any of them?

Year 4

It was lovely to welcome the children back to school this week. Everyone was refreshed and ready to begin another term.

As we entered into the month of November, we dedicated some time this week to remembering those that fought for our country. As a school, we focused on events surrounding World War One. In Year Four, we learnt about the event that triggered the start of WW1 - the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand. To begin with, the children were given a booklet of photographs and newspaper clippings from the time of the assassination. They used these to help them answer questions and find out what happened. The children really enjoyed being detectives! They were extremely interested in the story and couldn't believe it was true.

Following on from this, we wrote a diary entry from the point of view of the Archduke's bodyguard. Through his eyes, they re lived the day's events and described how he felt.

On Tuesday of this week, the whole school attended church to commemorate All Saint's Day. It was lovely to have the whole school together.

Year 5

All of the children have been working incredibly hard this week. On Monday, we held a Science day, where we completed our learning about Forces. We investigated the relationship between Mass, Weight and Gravity, conducted a fair test into the effects of air resistance on a range of differently-shaped objects and explored the use of pulleys, levers and gears in everyday life.

In Maths, we began our Multiplication and Division unit, identifying multiples and factors, as well as common multiples and factors. The children also used their knowledge of times tables to find the lowest common multiple (LCM) and highest common factor (HCF).

In English, we completed our final piece of writing for Shackleton's Journey, producing a balanced argument exploring whether the crew should remain at Patience Camp or use the life boats to sail to Elephant Island. The children used adverbials of time, modal verbs and causal conjunctions to structure their formal writing. Next week, we will be moving on to our new text - Room 13 by Robert Swindells.

To complete our work in History on the Maya, the children learned about Pok-Ta-Pok (one of the earliest ball games). They wrote instructions about how to play the game, including the rules and the religious significance of the game. The children also investigated a range of Maya artefacts, making inferences about their use, who would use them and justifying their opinions.

Question: Which parts of the body can not be used to pass the ball in Pok-Ta-Pok?

Year B

What a great start to the term we have had! Today we were lucky enough to have Safety Squad in school teaching us about keeping safe online, anti social behaviour, first aid and fire hazards. The children behaved fantastically and engaged maturely and enthusiastically with all the activities.

We started our new text, Letters from the Lighthouse, in English this week. This is a text set during World War 2 and has focuses upon the evacuation of two children. In History, we explored what evacuation was and thought about how children felt when they were evacuated. We put ourselves in the shoes of these children and imagined we were being evacuated from our homes. We were allowed to choose 10 items to take with us- this was extremely challenging! We then created posters to persuade families to evacuate their children or to persuade families to take in evacuees. We also participated in a Now Press Play session to immerse ourselves into what life was like for children during World War 2. In Maths we have been focusing upon long multiplication and we have been multiplying 4 digit numbers by 2 digit numbers. The children have showed great determination and resilience whilst doing this- Well done Year 6!

Question: What items did children take with them when they were evacuated?
